Organizational Profile



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About DAWEO

DAWEO represented one out of a small range of organizations supporting the Afghan Women Protection Centers (WPCs) known as shelters. DAWEO was initially established as a local office of the Danish NGO Danner, which has worked with VAW survivors for more than 35 years through shelter activities and political policy work in Denmark.

In 2012, Danner began its work in Afghanistan by partnering with the country’s most progressive women’s rights organizations, which together ran the 26 WPCs in Afghanistan. Over time, the necessity of a closer working relationship and linkage to state actors to ensure a more holistic approach to bettering the service delivery for female survivors of VAW in Afghanistan became clear. In 2015, DAWEO initiated cooperation with state entities by providing training to ministry staff (Ministry of Hajj and Ministry of Women’s Affairs and later with Ministry of Interior and Hajj) and by facilitating dialogue and cooperation between civil society and authorities through joint strategic meetings on VAW.

A vision of a locally based organization was formulated already in 2014, and Danner focused its work on localizing the management of the activities in order to hand over the response to the

office in Kabul. In 2018, the project management was officially handed over to the new-established NGO under the name of Danner Afghanistan Women Empowerment Organization (DAWEO).

With securing the 10 years of background and overall vision, DAWEO continues the strategic focus on strengthening the work and capacity of professionals in the field of VAW in general in terms of professionalizing the methodological approaches and strengthening the professional network with relevant government and non-government entities. During the past years providing capacity building-trainings for the mentioned entities formed an integral part of DAWEO's activities besides advocacy and awareness raising-interventions. So far, DAWEO conducted trainings for 8 WPC organizations (WAW, VoW, LSO,

ORCD, CAF, HAWCA, AWSDC) and three ministries of Interior, Religious Affairs and Women's Affairs in, Kabul, Herat and Mazar covering nearby provinces. Based on 5 years strategy of DAWEO developed in 2019/2020.

With the help of the United Nations Women's financial support, DAWEO was able to launch WPC and FGC in 2021. All of the project's actions were planned to support and shield vulnerable women and those who required counselling in both the legal and psychological realms. The project was carried out in the province of Bamyan, but unfortunately, DAWEO's operations were halted until May 2022 with the fall of Kabul and the change of government.

In June 2022, DAWEO was able to pick up where it left off. Due to the project's implementation in the province of Bamyan, DAWEO changed the project's nature and name. By doing this, we were able to move forward with the project somewhat in accordance with the Islamic Emirate government's policies and regulations and circumvent their reasons for not allowing the family resource center to open. The FRC Bamyan is still active in a number of educational fields, including reading, English, math, Islamic education, health, legal awareness training, and vocational training in the garment section. DAWEO also runs programs in the area of psychological counselling. So that DAWEO's family resource center offers beneficial services to women and their families

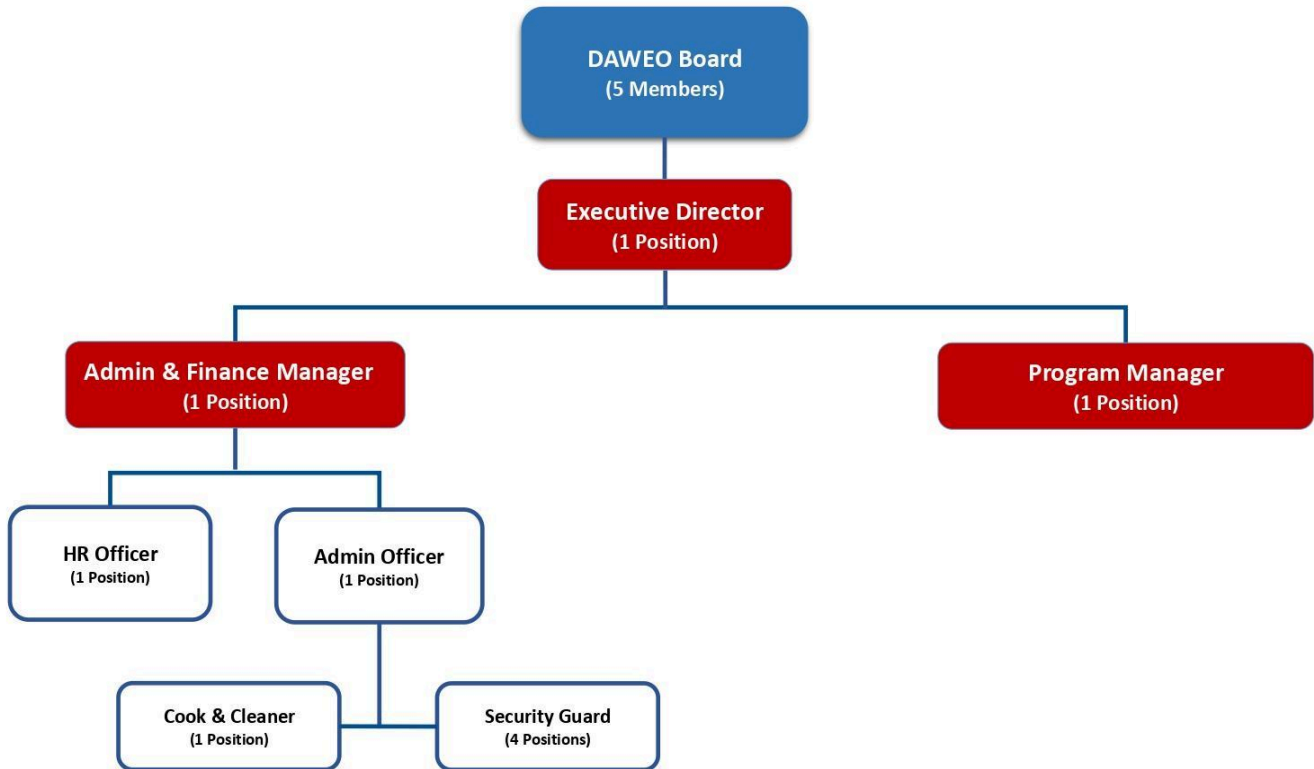

DAWEO is a woman-led organization, Wahida Salaam serves as the director of the NGO selected based on her experience working with Danner since 2012. The board of DAWEO has consisted of members who have been selected based on their experience and qualification, and one seat of the observer has been dedicated to Danner Copenhagen.

Violence against Women in Afghanistan

VAW is the most widespread violation of human rights, and Afghanistan is by far one of the most challenged countries when it comes to ensuring women a safe and self-sustainable life.

The four decades of prolonged armed conflict across the country has contributed to significant levels of instability, insecurity, violence, rule of law challenges, poverty and underdevelopment, which have obstructed the effective realization and enjoyment of human rights for people of Afghanistan. It must be stressed that the insecurity, pervasive levels of gender-based violence and an ever-present climate of fear has had a disproportionate impact on the promotion, protection and fulfilment of human rights of women and girls.

There are numerous reports documenting the extent of VAW in Afghanistan. Figures released in 2013 by WHO show that in South-East Asia – including Afghanistan – 37% of women reported having experienced physical and/or sexual intimate partner violence at some point in their lives, which is the highest percentage compared to other regions¹. Additionally, findings from a survey on domestic violence in Afghanistan by Global Rights in 2008 concluded that 87% of women in Afghanistan have experienced at least one kind of physical, psychological, sexual violence or forced marriage.

According to the published report of the Independent Human Rights Commission of Afghanistan in 2017, the level of violence against women has increased to 21.8% compared to 2016. this is highly worrying and unacceptable².

There is a dire need of professional response mechanisms to improve the service delivery within the field of VAW, enhance awareness across the field as well as ensure a strong linkage and coordination between all entities and authorities to bring down the extreme level of VAW. A holistic approach to VAW with the focus on bringing down the violence is key to furthering gender equality, which, in turn, is a vital step on the path of social and economic development.

DAWEO Activities

Activities in 2018

DAWEO operates in a post-conflict country where working for women's rights and specifically with shelter activities as a focal area poses a security threat and is a challenge to all organizations working in the field.

Nevertheless, the work is vital in securing female victims of violence a proper response. DAWEO's continued collaboration with partners and state authorities here plays an essential part of its approach and ensures that the activities are implemented to the best of its ability.

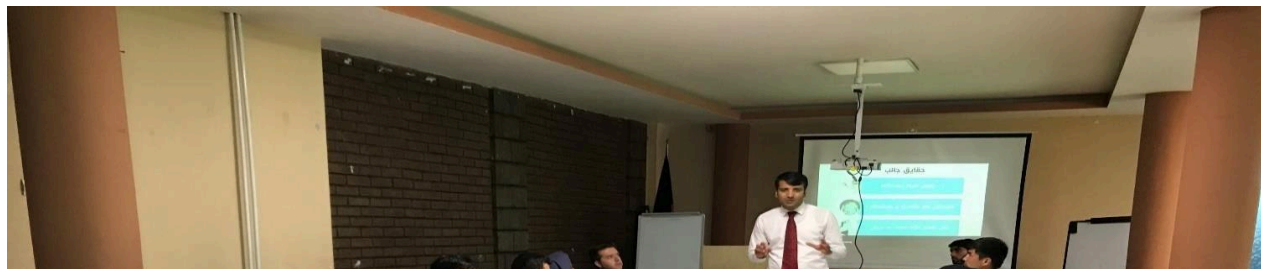
The shelter movement has evolved rapidly over the past decade despite a lack of political support and focus on the field as well as societal opposition towards the work of the WPCs. DAWEO's extensive capacity building activities has fed directly into an existing need expressed by the WPCs to professionalise their support to survivors of VAW. Furthermore, through its work, DAWEO has contributed to improving networking and thereby strengthened the WPCs joint work.

DAWEO focuses on strengthening the work and capacity of professionals in the field of VAW to enhance and guarantee appropriate services to VAW survivors in Afghanistan. This is done through three strategic focal interventions:

- Provide capacity-building training to WPC staff from all over Afghanistan in three zones: (Kabul, Herat and Mazar) covering the nearby provinces in the mentioned locations.
- Provide capacity-building trainings to staff of the Ministry of Women's Affairs (MoWA) and Ministry of Haj (MoHaj);
- Strengthening linkage between CSOs as well as MoWA and MoHaj.

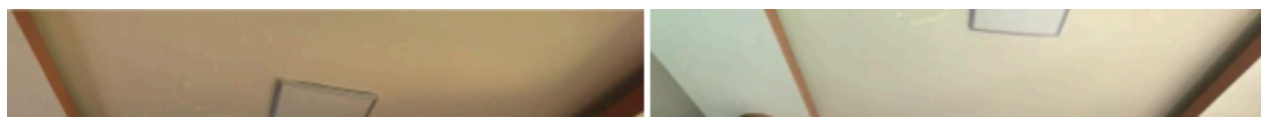

DAWEO Activities in 2019

The project for 2019 is a continuation of DAWEO's engagement, from 2011-18 managed by the Danish NGO (Danner) and from 2018 managed by the local NGO Danner Afghanistan for Women Empowerment Organization (DAWEO).

Women in Afghanistan continue to experience violence in all aspects of their lives and limited support is available to them. Service delivery based on unskilled and untrained staff and approaches, adds to the existing challenges. Therefore, professionalization of services that these women receive, remains vital. Civil society organizations and government institutions work tirelessly to provide support and opportunities for these women. DAWEO is committed to



backing their efforts in providing professionalized and standardized services through capacity building trainings and bridging the gap between civil society organizations and the duty bearers. Civil society organizations and relevant government institutes continue to express their needs in getting the professional help and training in order to bring positive impact in their work. For 2019 and 2020 DAWEO aims to continue its previous approach merging with new techniques to leave a bigger impact.

DAWEO signed MoU with the seven WPCs for 2019 program. After need assessment in each WPC, DAWEO developed the Training package and started conducting the ToT trainings. The training topics were Communication, Stress management, counselling, EAW, WPC regulation, Mediation, Trauma, Selfcare, national law and decision making. The two rounds training conducted in Kabul, Herat and Mazar covering central, western and northern zones, participants attended from neighboring provinces. The trainings sessions conducted as following:

- 1- Conducting the four-day WPC trainings in Kabul on 10-13 June (13 Participants), in Herat 07-10 July (14 Participants) and in Mazar 24-27 June (19 Participants).
- 2- Conducting the two-day follow up sessions in Kabul on 17-18 September (13 Participants), in Herat 29-30 October (14 Participants) and in Mazar 08-09 October (18 Participants)
- 3- DAWEO planned for 8 site visits through the year unfortunately site visit to Jawzjan was cancelled due to security issues. So, the trainers had 7 site visits:
 - On 3rd September, Mazar
 - On 16th September, Kabul
 - On 15th October, Kapisa
 - On 16th October, Nangarhar
 - On 20th October, Parwan
 - On 27th October, Ghor
 - On 31st October, Herat

DAWEO has signed MoU with the MoHajj and MoWA. Both mentioned ministries, have provided DAWEO their need assessments and DAWEO considered and based these assessments in building the training manual. As two ministries suggested, DAWEO organized 3 rounds of training for each mentioned Ministries. The participants attended from different provinces.

The trainings for MoHaj staff mainly focused on, gender, its history and impact on the society, gender-based violence, feminism and awareness on the Women Protection Centers' work and effectiveness, women right from the perspective of Islam, the enforced national and international laws on protection of women rights. The MoHaj training sessions were conducted in the following dates:

- The first round of training conducted on 08-11 April (17 Participants)
- The second round on 21-24 April (23 Participants)
- Third round on 22-25 September (18 Participants)

DAWEO also organized 3 rounds of four-day trainings for the MoWA participants coming from Kabul and provinces where the MoWA staff were trained on WPC regulation, EVAW law and client trust building/ interview skills. In addition, the participants had the opportunity to develop expertise on Mediation, its theory and practice, the articles of Civil Code relating to their work, monitoring, and evaluation and confidentially. The training rounds of MoWA were scheduled as:

- The first round of training conducted on 21-24 July (20 Participants)
- The second round on 04-07 August (19 Participants)
- Third round on 25-28 August (19 Participants)

Over the past years, DAWEO has been successful in bridging the gap between CSOs and the government institutions through ASN and inter- coordination among the two on several occasions. Particularly, DAWEO is responsible for hosting the external ASN meetings since Nov 2015. These meetings have enabled practical solutions for challenges brought up at these meetings. The aim of the ASN meetings is to find possible solutions.

to the challenges/obstacle WPCs face with relevant govt./non-govt org and the external ASN provides a productive platform for this. Moreover, a stronger coordination among the CSOs and the relevant ministries is required in order to provide unified and coherent responses to VAW. DAWEO in an effort to maintain and strengthen this cooperation throughout the year hosted 3 ASN external meetings 20th February 31st July and 23rd December.

In the mentioned meetings, the agendas of the meetings were prepared based on the request of the WPCs and in the meeting sessions in addition to the WPC's representatives, the representatives from relevant governmental institutions such as MoI, MoPh, MoE, the Attorney General office, the Supreme Court, CEO, Red Crescent, AIHRC, MoWA, MoHaj, MoJ, and other relevant national and international institutions were invited to discuss and find solutions for the ongoing challenges within their authorities. In these meetings, the challenges of WPCs with the mentioned institutions were discussed and, in some cases, proper action in cooperating the WPCs was taken by the relevant authority. In addition, the WPCs were connected to the representatives of the governmental institutions such as PDs, MoPH and MoI to solve their challenges and promote cooperation.

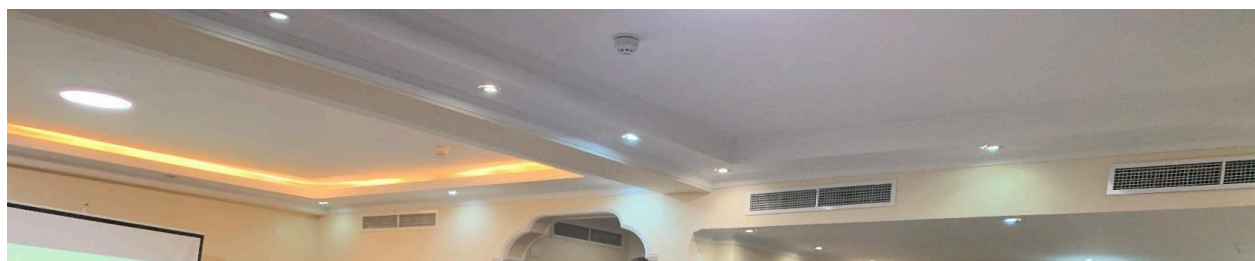


Figure 6, Afghan women Shelters Network coordination meeting, Kabul, 2019

DAWEO Activities in 2021-2022

DAWEO has signed an agreement with UN-Women for running the FRC project in Bamyan province and provides services (Islamic and health education, legal awareness, vocational trainings) under a new structure called Family Resource Center (FRC). The mentioned areas have been added and suggested by the governor of Bamyan from the de facto authorities in March 2022.

For this project, we plan to build on DAWEO's past experiences where the required potential and knowledge are already in place. We see that there especially need to provide such awareness and services specially for women addressing GBV through provision of legal awareness, psychosocial support, and trainings on role of women in Islam for both men and women, however, the focus will be more on community & religious leaders and women & girls.

More than 300 women have received training from DAWEO in a variety of subjects, including literacy, Mathematic, English, Islamic education, health awareness, Tailoring, and legal counsel at the Family Resource Center.

Considering Afghanistan's delicate political situation as well as cultural restrictions, luring women to the regions is not a simple endeavor. but DAWEO was able to resolve this issue by comprehending the relevant institutions and organizations. local councils, Municipal representatives (Wakil-Gozar) were among those who helped us determine which women were at risk, in need, as well as who needed psychosocial treatment and legal counsel. DAWEO is doing its best to provide capacity building and professional training for women in the current situation, where the political regime has completely changed.

One of the tactics that helped us successfully administer this program was fostering trust among the locals and DAWEO. Nevertheless, despite the numerous challenges we faced, our achievement was largely due to our tenacity, experience, and in-depth knowledge of the subject.

From June to December 2022 student registration is still going well, and DAWEO plans to offer educational, awareness, and psychological programs to more than 1,300 women in the Bamyán province by June 2023.

Many women have been able to support themselves financially by enrolling in vocational programs at the Family Resource Center like food processing and sewing.

One of the educational items used by families was financial literacy training, which was taught to women by DAWEO trainers. The training rounds of FRC were as below:

- Totally 101 students benefited from English class from June to Dec 2022
- The 65 students in literacy classes
- The 47 students in Mathematic classes
- A total of 115 persons received Islamic studies and legal advice.
- 90 women graduated from sewing class.
- 50 women benefited from financial literacy.
- 112 women benefited from health programs and consultations.
- And 100 people learned to recite the holy Quran.

DAWEO activities in 2023 and 2024

In 2023, following the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) mandate banning women's activities and employment on December 24, 2022, the activities of the DAWEO were temporarily halted. Given the official prohibition on women working, continuing our programs became increasingly risky. In response to this challenge, DAWEO pivoted to online operations from January to May 2023. During this period, we provided online services in health and psychosocial counseling while also following up on previously registered gender-based violence (GBV) cases. We successfully offered psychosocial and health counseling to 60 women and followed up on 28 GBV cases, in addition to addressing 12 in-person cases within our psychiatric section, which were deemed too serious for online support.

In July 2023, DAWEO entered into a new contract with Unwoman, with a contract duration extending to August 2024. This initiative, titled Health and Economic Empowerment (HEE), aims to foster a shift in societal attitudes and awareness regarding Islamic law, health, psychosocial issues, and education—areas that are often scrutinized and contested. The project also seeks to enhance the capacities of civil society organizations (CSOs), non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and government employees in Afghanistan through a comprehensive and knowledge-based approach, focusing primarily on women and girls facing mental health challenges.

At the HEE Centre, we offer a range of women's health services, aiming to assist 600 women in the health department, 600 women in the psychosocial department, 600 women in vocational

training, and 300 men in accessing psychosocial counseling services. Additionally, we plan to conduct nine rounds of seminars for 540 women and girls throughout June 2023, addressing critical topics related to psychotherapy.

The vocational training program encompasses three key areas:

1. Food processing
2. Embroidery
3. Dairy products

Through these initiatives, we strive to empower women, promote mental well-being, and enhance economic opportunities within the community.

The project is being implemented in the Bamiyan and Paktia provinces, focusing on delivering vocational training programs directly within local villages. These home-based initiatives are made possible through close collaboration and support from community members and respected local elders. Despite facing various challenges, including restrictions imposed by the Directorate of Foreign Affairs (DFA) and relevant ministries, as well as the complex process of signing Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with essential governmental bodies, we have successfully met our targets in accordance with our established plan.

In a significant milestone this year, DAWEO proudly became a member of the Gender-Based Violence Sub-Cluster (GBVSC) under the auspices of UNFPA (United Nations Population Fund). This membership signifies our commitment to addressing sensitive issues surrounding gender-based violence and empowering women in vulnerable communities.

Looking ahead, in 2024, DAWEO also secured a project contract with UNDP (United Nations Development Program), launching a critical six-month initiative aimed at enhancing community resilience. This project is divided into two main components: health services and disaster relief support tailored for communities affected by natural calamities such as earthquakes and floods.

In the health sector, we have implemented essential psychosocial support (PSS) counseling services in the Yakawlang district of Bamiyan, providing much-needed emotional and mental health assistance to those in distress. Additionally, as part of our disaster relief efforts, we distributed hygiene kits, blankets, and essential kitchen tools to 250 families across various districts and villages in Bamiyan. These vital supplies are intended to alleviate the hardships faced by families recovering from recent disasters, ensuring they have access to basic necessities and improving their overall living conditions.

Through these collective efforts, we are not only addressing immediate needs but also working towards long-term social and economic development within these communities. Our commitment to excellence and community engagement continues to drive our initiatives, with a strong focus on sustainability and empowerment for all.

Challenges in 2023 and 2024:

In 2023 and 2024, due to the prohibition of women from working on projects related to women, there are many challenges, such as not signing the MoU with the relevant ministries, non-cooperation of provincial sectors, interference of DFA in the affairs of NGOs, and not accepting the signature of female heads of NGOs. The change of board members from women to men was one of the very serious problems faced by women-led organizations.

Future Plans

DAWEO has partnered with UN-Women for three year-long projects, and the UNW fund will end in September 2025. So, DAWEO needs to find another donor to ensure sustainability and not lose the 12-year experience, lessons learned, network, knowledge, and skills that were obtained during these years. The following activities are planned to be implemented by the end of 2024-2025:

1. Collaboration among CSOs and WPCs:

One of the concerns that DAWEO found important is the networking between the entities that work in women empowerment and violence against women advocacy sector. Thus, by facilitating dialogue and cooperation between civil society and authorities through joint strategic meetings on violence against women, DAWEO creates a sustainable and remarkable networking between Civil Society Organizations and Women Protection Centers.

2. Public Awareness on Women Protection Center services and women's rights:

Awareness has been always one of priorities of DAWEO. People do not have right idea about the women protection center. DAWEO tries to deliver the correct picture of these center to the people by holding conference, events, debates, meetings, visual awareness such as billboards, video clips and other means to spread the message on women's rights and the women protection centers.

3. DAWEO has plans to expand the activity area in the statute in the different areas of vocational training, health, humanitarian, natural disasters, climate, and education.
4. DAWEO is trying to find the necessary financial resources to continue its activities, which is why we have made various proposals to partner financial institutions to adapt our programs and plans for the coming years according to social needs and the problems present in women's society.
